Conversations at Home

It is important to speak with your student about the cost of college/postsecondary education in relation to what your family can offer. The following should be questions that you explore with your student:

- How much can our family afford and are we willing to contribute to the cost of college/postsecondary education each year?
- How much is the student expected to contribute to the cost of college/postsecondary education?
- If loans are needed to cover the remaining costs, who will take out the loan?

Explore the cost of numerous colleges and discuss how they will also need to pay for books, supplies, housing, food, and transportation. Remember that the price that you see listed won't be the final price you pay due to financial aid. Start talking about these questions now and begin making a plan to prepare your family financially for your student's postsecondary education.

Trades

Explore different pathways to graduation with your student. If your student is interested in the trades they could attend Central Vermont Career Center (CVCC). CVCC has a number of interesting programs available which include: automotive technology, culinary arts, building trades, cosmetology, digital media arts, electrical technology, emergency services, exploratory technology, medical professions, natural resources and sustainability, as well as plumbing and heating. Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships are a great postsecondary education option for your student especially if they are interested in the trades. Apprenticeships offer paid work experience as well as classroom training. The Vermont Registered Apprenticeship program assists Vermonters in setting up structured, flexible training programs to meet the specific needs of Vermont employers. There are nearly 700 active apprenticeships in Vermont in over 25 occupations. Employers participate in Registered Apprenticeships by "sponsoring" individuals as apprentices. Vermont Apprenticeships are available through a variety of partners including the Vermont Department of Labor (VDOL), Community College of Vermont and Vermont Technical College.
